What is the VPI?

The VPI is a six year, multi-departmental,

government - community partnership to

find long-term solutions to violence against

those most at risk in our society.

What is the VPI?

- The VPI is guided by a 6 Year Plan of Action Taking Action Against Violence 2006-2012.
- The Plan supports building stronger, resilient communities with strategies and resources to prevent and reduce violence in our province.
- The Plan was developed with community and government input and approved by Cabinet in 2006.
- The Plan is supported by an approximate annual budget of \$2 million and an additional stand alone community grants program of \$200,000 for Aboriginal women and communities.

Specific Purpose of the Initiative

To increase government and community capacity to achieve, in the long term, a reduction in violence against women, children, youth, Aboriginal women and children, older persons, persons with disabilities and others who are vulnerable to violence because of race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, or economic status.

VPI Committee of Ministers

The VPI is led by the VPI Committee of Ministers and chaired by the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women, the Honourable Kathy Dunderdale:

Deputy Minister's Working Committee and Community Advisory Committee

- The Deputy Minister's Steering Committee was established in 2006 to facilitate the directions set by Government for this work.
- A Community Advisory Committee was also established in 2006 to facilitate the directions established in the Plan.
- The Community Advisory Committee is made up of the Chairs of each of the 10 Regional Coordinating Committees and meets with DM's Committee at least once a year.

Regional Coordinating Committees (RCC's)

- There are 10 RCC's across the province.
- RCC's are located within each of the Rural Secretariat regions, plus an additional committee in the Western Avalon Region.
- Each RCC receives \$70,000 annually.
- The Labrador Committee receives an additional \$20,000 annually to accommodate for travel.

Mandate of RCCs

RCC's are uniquely structured to enable community and government service delivery partners to:

- create public awareness and action;
- work in an integrated and co-ordinated manner to advance violence prevention services and activities at the regional level;
- improve communication between service providers and service recipients;
- improve information sharing on best practices;
- improve efficiencies in service delivery;
- improve community capacity building.

What are Violence and Abuse?

- Violence and abuse are best understood as a pattern of behaviour intended to establish power and maintain control over family, household members, intimate partners, colleagues or groups. The roots of all forms of violence and abuse are found in the many types of inequality which continue to exist and grow in our society.
- Violence and abuse may occur only once, involve various tactics of subtle manipulation or occur frequently while escalating over a period of months or years. In any form, violence and abuse profoundly affect individual health and well-being.

Forms of Violence

- Physical -- pushing, punching etc. Physical violence occurs when someone uses a part of their body or an object to control your actions.
- Sexual -- forced sexual intercourse, denial of a woman's sexuality etc. Sexual violence occurs when someone forces you to take part in sexual activity when you do not want to.
- Emotional -- name calling, jealousy etc. Emotional violence occurs when someone says or does something to make you feel stupid or worthless.
- Psychological -- threats of violence, constant humiliation etc.
 Psychological violence occurs when someone uses threats and causes fear in you to gain control.
- Spiritual -- preventing you from practicing your religious beliefs; forcing your to raise your children under a different religion, etc.
 Spiritual violence occurs when someone uses your religious or spiritual beliefs to manipulate, dominate, or control you.

Forms of Violence (Cont'd)

- Cultural -- female circumcision, rape-marriage etc. Cultural violence occurs when you are harmed as a result of practices condoned by your culture, religion or tradition.
- Verbal -- constant criticism, repeated insults etc. Verbal abuse occurs when someone uses language, whether spoken or written, to cause you harm
- Financial -- destruction of personal property, forbidding access to family income and bank accounts etc. Financial abuse occurs when someone controls your financial resources without your consent.
- Neglect -- not providing needed medical care, food or shelter, etc.
 Neglect occurs when someone has the responsibility to provide care or assistance for you but does not


